
CONTEST ISSUE - FEB. MEETING SALE ISSUE

Tom (Versatility) Harrison is getting very low on blank IPMS hard plastic name tags so get your requests in right away. Dave Cooper, the man we elected to do our King Midas imitation for the club this year is still holding a name tag for a "BILL" that was prepaid and produced three months ago and is yet unclaimed. Last minute planning was done by Rodney for the contest which was two days hence. Judges, helpers, table coverings, arrival times, vendor tables and more were reviewed.

It was announced that the airshow at Moffet Field NAS will be the third weekend of August, 1986. I hope this is the 15th, 16th because if it is the following weekend it will probably conflict with the Historic Auto Races at Laguna Seca Raceway which is honoring Mercedes—Benz this year with the factory intending to bring over the W196 for the event.

It was commented that Car & Driver magazine covered the Reno Air Races for 1985 in a very nice fashion. I will agree entirely, as the article in the March 1986 issue, titled "Sound of Ancient Thunder", was excellent. Gorgeous photography and excellent writing, giving much more of a feeling of both the spectators and the event than most aircraft magazines I have seen which seem to have the same delicacy as a B-29 lapping the course, and concentrate on wingtip modifications too often. This article reminded me very much of when I have gone to the Reno National Air Races.

After we buzzed the issues with Bauer's piloting, an auction was held for some of Jay's models. A couple I missed out on were valued at more than \$25 to most collectors and sold for under \$2.00!

The ones that were auctioned off did bring some interesting amounts: ITC MB-2/\$25, AMT Shackleton/\$18.50, Aurora D-8/\$11, Aurora P-6E/\$12.50, Frog Sea Vixen/\$24, Aurora C-141/\$9 and furious bidding netted Dave Hansen (now also a member) of San Antonio Hobby a Revell 1/48 F-102 for \$48. These prices were near collector's prices so the value was still there.

Everyone went back for one last round of shopping before Jay packed up the remaining kits and each of us packed up our booty with many cars leaving the parking lot with their rear ends virtually dragging off the ground, resting on their axle bump stops.

AAHS CONVENTION

I only had a short time to stop in at the AAHS Convention at the Sunnyvale Hilton and when I arrived, most of the members were out on the tours. About a half-dozen modelers from our club were displaying, but just as I got ready to leave and older gentleman named Phil Lathrop from Lafayette, Calif. arrived with two moderate-sized cases which he set down and proceeded to unload. He would just pull back some Kleenex-like tissues, pick-up a plane and just plunk it down on the table. Not two or three but dozens upon dozens. Some had wingspans barely more than the diameter of a quarter. Everyone of them was scratchbuilt in 1/96th scale! He has been building these for the past 30 years and brought 100 of his 250 plane collection.

Each was built from balsa wood, with handformed canopies, bamboo-blade props and handpainted markings. Many people thought they
were kits, at least the larger ones such as a
P2Y. There was no mistaking the smaller
planes for kits, despite their clean
appearance, because many were of very obscure
civilian and early military aircraft. Some
ranged into '50's prop/jet combo prototypes.
If you were not there, just try and imagine a
6' display table COVERED with 100 aircraft,
overlapping wings, all in the same scale.
One of those guys that comes out of the
woodwork on rare occasions. Too bad for us.
